This year, 192 fine citizens gathered to cast their votes in Forrest — the most progressive booth, in the most conservative electorate Wannon, in the most progressive state Victoria.

It's not often the whole district rolls into town. Supporters of the red, blue, orange, green, yellow and the other green team all mingled around the campfire, debating the great issues of our time: onions on top or underneath? (On top, obviously. We're not animals.)

The BBQ was a hit — snags, veggie burgers, and the waft of sizzling democracy. People stayed long after voting, catching up, sharing stories, and watching kids run amok and climb trees.

And as it happened, the whole thing fell on my birthday — getting to see nearly everyone I know (because they legally had to show up) and volunteering at the democracy sausage sizzle was the best present I could've asked for.



But it wasn't all fun and games, we raised \$419 for the Forrest and District Historical Society, who hosted with the kind of grassroots gusto that would put Canberra to shame. Special thanks to John Frizon for setting everything up; to my co-commander of tongs Leo Martin; to the volunteers handing out how to vote cards; and to everyone who helped fan the flames of democracy.

Turns out, the true taste of progress is lightly charred, locally engaged, and served with sauce.




The film won 8 French and European awards, including Best Foreign Film and Most Promising Actress for Louane Emera in the lead role. In 2021 an English-language remake of the film was released as CODA, and won three Academy Awards.

More than just firewood...

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFM Vic) is working in the bush at Centre Road near the Forrest Cemetery, with road closures in the area during the last week of May. The trails will be open again in June and with the added benefit of some firewood for community use.

Past management practices has resulted in prolific regrowth of the messmate stringybark (Eucalyptus obliqua) in the area, adding to the fuel load and the bushfire risk to the north of Forrest. A messmate stringybark on fire produces showers of sparks as the fine, highly flammable bark catches alight and floats through the air. The 'Stringybark Stomp' is a familiar dance move for forest managers and fire fighters as the sparks light spot fires at their feet. Strategic planned burning blackens the trunks and can reduce spark risk but can also result in significant regrowth of fire loving species like acacia which in turn can cause further fire risk without ongoing regular management.

Finding the balance for fuel management, while also restoring the forest structure, protecting flora and fauna, managing cultural values, and considering how the community use and enjoy forests is an ongoing challenge. And one that will be exacerbated in a warmer, dryer climate.

The Centre Road site is a trial area where FFM Vic has been working to manage and thin the messmate stringybarks to allow for recovery of herbaceous species which in turn encourage the return of native flora and fauna to the area. Natural thinning of the forest to reduce crowded monocultures and create space between bigger trees can take hundreds of years, with the risk of devastating wildfire increasing every time there is a dry spell. This is where FFM Vic is lending nature a hand, by mechanically thinning selected trees.

In partnership with environmental scientists and the Eastern Maar, the thinning work is being done with consideration to

social and cultural aspects and surrounding environment and ecology. Previously thinned areas are showing healthy recovery, with regular monitoring and wildlife cameras capturing encouraging diversity.

FFMVic is moving most of the wood to the roadside for community firewood, making for safe and easy pick up and reducing further disturbance to the forest from people driving into the trial area. Some logs will be retained in the bush for habitat so please pay attention to signage in the area, stay on the roadside and do not cut or remove any timber that is not allocated for firewood. Load limits and restrictions apply so check the website on www.ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood for information and to avoid possible fines.

BIRDS OF FORREST



Hooded Plover

The iconic and endangered Hooded Plover is found from about Kalbarri in Western Australia to South of Sydney in NSW. In the east they are usually always on sandy beaches and immediate environs, while in WA they also inhabit inland salt lakes, often in their 100's.

In much of their range in the east, they only survive on beaches because of the efforts of conservation groups, (such as in Apollo Bay) who erect signs and barriers when the birds are breeding. Here in our Shire they can be found right along our sandy beaches. A good place to look for them in Apollo Bay is from Wye Rive right around to Marengo, and further on.

Human recreation, horses, dogs vehicles etc often either disturbs the birds while they are breeding, or destroys the nests and young of these birds. They are a small bird, about 20cm long. Hooded Plovers feed by sight using their large eyes and short bills. They are opportunistic feeders, often running along the edge of the water in search of food. They eat a variety of invertebrates, crustaceans, molluscs, insects, worms and plant material. They nest in a shallow scrape in the sand, where 2/3 blotched eggs are laid. Again, we thank the conservation groups in Apollo Bay who give the birds a chance to raise their young, so that we can continue to see these amazing little birds into the future.
