





Roadworks and closures around Forrest

The Birregurra-Forrest Road between Forrest and Barwon Downs will undergo additional roadworks during October to install safety barriers. It is expected that the works will take approximately four weeks to complete with traffic management and speed limits in place and traffic down to one lane.

The works to replace the damaged culvit at the bridge closer to Barwon Downs, currently controlled by traffic lights, is ongoing. These works will require appropriate permits and environmental and cultural investigations to be completed before work to

replace the damaged culvit can commence. This is a longer term project that may take many months to complete.

Road closures will be in effect in Forrest, throughout the Otways and along the Great Ocean Road during the Amy's Grand Fondo bike race with thousands to decend on Lorne for the main event on Sunday 19 October. See page 5 for details or go to www.amysgranfondo.org.au/community-road-closures.

Drivers are urged to take care on the roads, obey signs and traffic management as conditions may change without warning.

A History of Earthmoving in Forrest

Tich Evans, born Alfred William Evans, was the eldest of three children and grew up in Forrest. He started working at the age of 14 to support his family during tough times. Tich worked as a grader driver for the Otway Shire and as a semi-trailer driver for Hayden Brothers' timber mill. When he married Lorraine, they travelled around the Otway Ranges with the Shire grader, living in a caravan during the week and with their parents on weekends until they settled in Forrest.

In 1970, at the age of 36, Tich purchased his first grader from William Adams Melbourne, marking the beginning of Tich's Grader Hire. His employers, Joe and Bill Hayden, were important mentors who supported him in acquiring the machine. Tich's first grader was a Caterpillar, which he drove home from Melbourne to Forrest with his 6-year-old son Sam beside him. This marked the start of his business, which initially served local farmers.

As the business grew, Tich acquired more machinery and trucks. The business continued to expand, and in 2013, Sam and his wife Tania took over the company, now known as Evans Earthmoving.

Sam, who had joined the business at a young age, continued to grow the company, acquiring larger machinery and taking on significant projects, including land development and environmental improvements. One notable project was the removal of willows from the East Barwon River, which had a significant positive impact on the environment.



Tich was known for his community service, often providing free services to those in need and contributing to local projects such as building netball and tennis courts and maintaining roads. This legacy of community service continues with Sam.

Evans Earthmoving has been involved in many bushfire responses since 1970, providing essential services in difficult and dangerous conditions. The company has grown to employ 22 people, with a fleet of 26 machines and 6 trucks. Sam and Tania's son, Andrew, has just completed his Civil Engineering Degree and is currently working for a firm in Geelong and may one day continue the family tradition.

In 2025, Evans Earthmoving celebrates 55 years of operation, remaining a significant local business in Forrest.

Time shifts and loops along with Hopkins' perceptions on the day, allowing us to experience his terror as he tries to make sense of changes in his surroundings and carers. I think it is a stunningly good film.





If you have a business in Forrest or surrounds, CFA is running a workshop on Wednesday 15 October tailored to your specific needs to ensure you are informed about how to prepare, share information and keep your staff and customers safe. With the fire season corresponding with times of high tourist visitation, if you run a tourism based business or accommodation this workshop will help you to plan for your business and customers.

A general fire safety planning workshop will be held at the school on Wednesday 22nd October with all welcome to attend.

BIRDS OF THE OTWAYS



Wedge-tailed Eagle

The magnificent Wedge-tailed Eagle, with a huge wingspan, is our largest and heaviest raptor. It is found all over Australia, from hot deserts to temperate forests.

In our area they are often seen circling effortlessly on thermal currents, with outstretched wings and upward pointing outer primary wing feathers. The iconic wedge tailed shape can easily be seen, making identification very easy.

The Wedge-tailed eagle hunts small to medium vertebrates, especially rabbits and small macropods. They can also take lager birds like cockatoos in flight with their huge, stretched out talons. They also eat carrion such as road kill, where they are sometimes struck by passing vehicles as they can take quite a while to get airborne with their heavy bodies.

These eagles build huge stick nests, often in an elevated spot that provides views all round. These are often used for decades. The picture of young birds on the nest that I have included was taken with a large telescopic lens, from quite a distance away as to not disturb the birds. They can desert the nest if disturbed, so if you find a nesting pair please be extra careful around their area. It is a pleasure so have these majestic birds in our district.
