# Wedded to the Otway Life: Rupert & Sally

Growing up on sixty acres in Central Victoria, Sally Snaith, 30, is no stranger to rural living. Though far from family, the task of getting established in a small community was a daunting assignment. "I was expecting to feel quite lonely out here." After just 14 short months, this fear has all but evaporated. "Working at the local school, you get instantly absorbed into the community which is epic. It's so nourishing."

For her partner, 'Nippers Kid' Rupert Grout, 31, the move was more daunting, far from the respite of salty Queenscliff air. "I [also] thought we would be so isolated out here, but the community is so active, to the point we are probably more busy here than we were in Melbourne. We've got epic neighbours and we've become involved with Landcare events around town."

For Sally, Gerangamete has brought to fruition a lifelong dream. "Riding my horse out of the paddock and straight into beautiful state forest, it's dreamy!"

In November last year, the two tied the knot under a characteristically Victorian sky. "We were worried it was going to be dry and too hot, but instead we got 35 mm in a couple hours," said Sally. Following a garden ceremony, the night was danced away under a disco ball in the barn.

Branded with the scars of a recent mountain biking incident, Rupert was not the only wounded soldier. "An ambulance was called at 6am. A boozed-up Uncle Simon had fallen down a hill and broken 8 ribs. He ended up in urgent care!"

The two can't wait to get more involved in the community with like-minded folks. "We're pretty sociable people," they said. For Sally, this happened sooner than expected, "I just can't believe we've already made friends. I feel so grateful."



When asked what brought the two out this way in the first place, Rupert replied, "Why wouldn't you? It's f\*%^\$!g paradise!"

## Stevensons Falls Back in Action!

Forrest Fire Management announced the re-opening of Stevensons Falls near Barramunga on the 16th of December. Since Spring of 2022, various contractors have been down at the site completing major upgrades to support visitors and campers to the area.

The development boasts some great features, including:

- An upgrade to the 500 meter walkway to the base of the waterfall, making it one of the longest fullyaccessible walkways to a waterfall in the country.
- New accessible facilities including a viewing platform at the base of the waterfall, a toilet block, pedestrian bridge, and parking.
- Two additional smaller trails to provide visitors with multiple avenues to explore the site. A Redwoods Boardwalk showcasing the beautiful Californian Redwoods, and the Blue Spruce Walk taking visitors for an adventure beside the Gellibrand River.
- A new dedicated picnic area complete with picnic tables, river access, and a larger car park.

The adjoining campground has also been upgraded, with a new toilet, landscaping and drainage works. The project was a part of 'Victoria's Great Outdoors', a \$106.6 million investment into better walking trails, campgrounds, four-wheel drive tracks and visitor



facilities to make it easier and more affordable for everyone to explore Victoria's parks and forests. The upgrade at Stevensons Falls was budgeted at a cost of \$1.35 million when it was announced back in 2022.

Stevensons Falls is a short 15-minute drive South-West of Forrest and has a lot to offer; at times being named the 'Jewel' of the Otways. The site attracts over 80,000 visitors each year. It makes for a great day out and is worth the trip this Summer to check out all the upgrades!

# Dress up and enjoy Casablanca

Casablanca with a '40s glamour dress-up theme is the first Forrest Flicks Film Society screening for 2024. This is your chance to don a dinner jacket or vintage dress, pick up a champagne glass and join your friends to enjoy a night of impossible wartime choices.

Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman star in this 1942 soft-focus classic of love and wartime tension. Bogart is perfectly cast as Nick, a cynical expatriate American running a stylish nightclub in Casablanca, Morocco. The country is at the time part of unoccupied France, so a hotspot for refugees fleeing wartorn Europe.

Bergman plays Ilse, Nick's former lover, who arrives in town with her resistance-leader husband

Laszlo (Paul Heinreid). They need an escape route from the Nazis and as luck would have it, Nick holds papers allowing two persons' safe passage to Portugal. Ilse and Nick find they are still in love and the choice between being together and supporting the resistance is ultimately up to Nick.



Directed by Michael Curtiz, the film won three Academy Awards including best picture. Rotten Tomatoes' critics have named it 'an undisputed masterpiece'.

Casablanca will screen at the Forrest Hall on Thursday 8 February. Doors open at 7 pm with a free glass of wine, nibbles and cheese. The film starts at 7:30, followed by tea, coffee, biscuits and a chance to chat about the film with other Forresters.

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

A race of this reputation, and with some large prize money up for grabs, has brought together Australia's best riders to chase the elusive Otway Odyssey title.

Who will be crowned 'King of The Otways' & 'Queen of The Otways' in 2024? Head down to the oval on race day to show your support and find out. Registrations are open online until the races start, so it's not too late to be part of the fun.



# Recipes from a Forrest Kitchen: Tofu with Asian Vegetables

2 x 500g firm tofu (we recommend Ryo's local tofu @ https://oborodotofu.storeinfo.jp)

- 2 spring onions
- 2 garlic cloves
- 2 tablespoons onion jam or chilli seasoning
- 2 tablespoons Ketjap Manis

Gluten free cornflour or potato starch for dusting Steamed asian greens of choice or broccolini

Heat oil in a wok or deep fry pan to 180°C. Dust tofu with cornflour, shaking off excess. Deep fry in batches, turn occasionally until golden brown.

Drain on kitchen paper. Cook garlic and spring onions for 2 minutes. Stir in Ketjap and onion jam and 2 tbsp water then add tofu. Stir gently to coat. Serve over steamed vegetables.

## An Incomplete Story

Long after the calls from journalists cease and social media posts from family and friends dwindle, the individual stories of those swimming at Lorne back beach on Tuesday, 16th January live on.

This is something that Laura Shawcross, 33, of Forrest is reckoning with in real-time. "It wasn't a heroic story, it was just chance." Paddling in the shallows with her two young children, Laura was early on the scene to an eight-year-old girl being pulled from the water, unconscious and without a pulse. A practising midwife, Laura commenced CPR until the paramedics arrived and airlifted the young girl to Melbourne.

It is the aftermath of this event however which has left Laura reflecting on how we process big life moments societally. "The police called me to say she is going to live, but to what capacity? We may never know her long-term prognosis. I think about that a lot at night."

The so-called 'heroics' of Laura's actions were reported in local media outlets from Geelong through to Colac, "It almost feels cheap, like fifteen minutes of fame. It was lovely, all the nice comments of support. But at the same time, there is a story that continues well after that fifteen minutes of fame has passed that is not going to get that spotlight."

For three-year-old Albie Shawcross, the chaos of that scene continues to be the source of much confusion.



"Albie was so distressed because he could read the stress of other people and see something was wrong. He kept asking questions until he understood. We haven't spoken about it since, and then just yesterday, he started asking more questions."

Laura dreams of a media where humanity drives the stories we tell and captures more of the whole person. "In that moment, looking at her, she was a stranger, and she had this whole life I didn't know about. I don't want her life being reduced to this traumatic moment. It's not her whole story."

# **BIRDS OF FORREST**



### Golden Whistler

The Golden Whistler is a common species of bird around Forrest. There are also other types of Whistlers around here including the Olive and the Rufous. The Golden Whistler is found over a wide area of Australia, including Tasmania, Western Australia; and from South Australia through to Northern Queensland.

They are also found in a wide variety of habitats, including rainforests, temperate forests and woodlands. They will also come into well planted

gardens, where they can usually be heard with their 'tchee-tchee- tuwhit' call before they are seen. The male has a distinctive yellow breast, white throat and a black head; while the female is mainly brown, sometimes with a bit of yellow colouring under the tail. With a length of about 17cm, they are slightly smaller than the ubiquitous Grey Shrike-Thrush.





They are usually seen singularly or in pairs, where they hunt for arthropods from foliage and bark.

These Whistlers are common and can be seen in many places including the township, the West Barwon Dam, Lake Elizabeth, and any other areas where there are trees and shrubs.
